Labeling Clothing!

Children, ages 3 and up are expected to keep track of their own belongings—it's the Montessori way, \mathfrak{S}

Others may wear clothing of their choice; however, it must be suitable for school. Our non-holiday approach was adopted so that all family beliefs could be respected, allowing families to "celebrate" in their own way with their own friends and families. We felt that too often, teachers were bringing in their own family practices into the classroom, imposing these beliefs on the children. Our policy was balanced in the knowledge that those families who chose to celebrate holidays could easily do it on their own without school influences or competition.

Keeping with our school philosophy of not celebrating holidays, we will instead celebrate the season with a "Harvest Festival." We will have special activities on this day. On Wednesday, October 30th, please have your child bring 4-6 apples (any kind) to put through the cider press.
